PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Teachers, coaches and support staff have continued to be busy over the last week despite the building being closed. We continue to monitor engagement from students and it is wonderful to see them continuing to complete work and seeking help from teachers where it is needed. Thinking about longer term plans can be an important part of staying motivated through these challenging times. Therefore, it is fortunate that the summer term is traditionally when we encourage our first year students to further develop their plans for the future.

The majority of A Level students nationally progress to university and students at NSFC are 10% more likely to progress to university than students with similar GCSE results elsewhere. A small but increasing number of students take up higher and degree level apprenticeships after NSFC, and these limited and highly competitive opportunities are also important to consider.

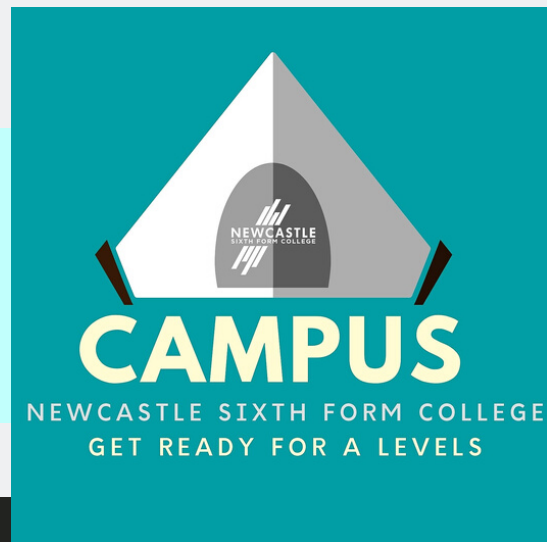

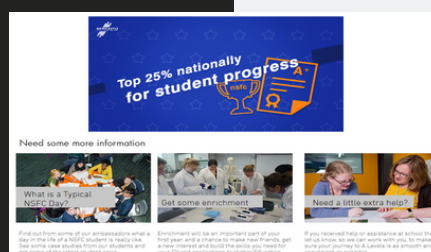
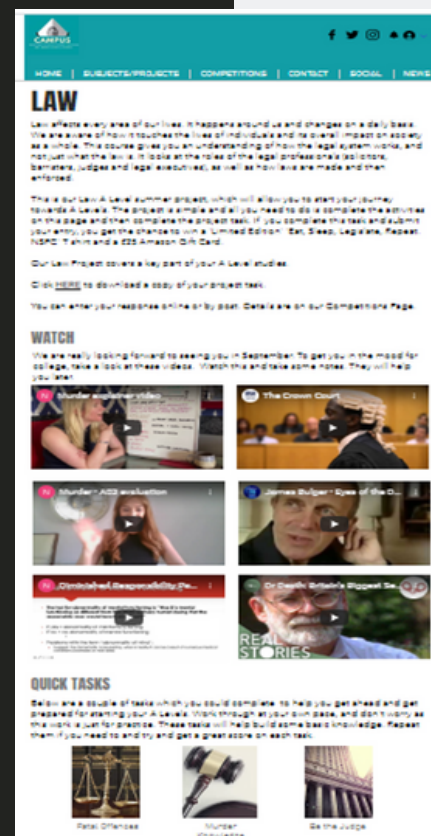
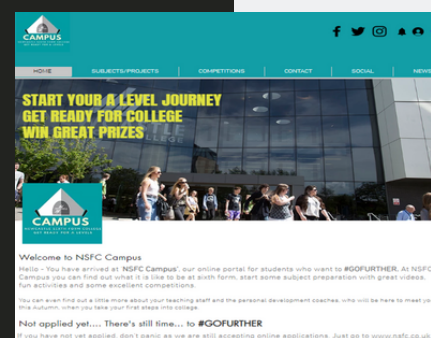
Competitions
